Council Meeting: The Hague

YEPP gathered for its Council Meeting from the 11th to the 14th of April, for the first time in the Benelux in the last 15 years, to discuss the role of Europe in building a common defence, implementing effective energy policies, and understanding the role of the centre-right against extremist parties. The event was organised by CDJA, the youth of the CDA (EPP), with the support of the Konrad Adenauer Stiftung (KAS).

Dutch Deputy PM Karien van Gennip delivered a keynote speech to open the conference. She stressed the importance of giving equal opportunities to everyone and the centrality of Europe's continuous support for Ukraine, recalling that "the best way to avoid war is to prepare for war."

A Europe of Regions: Multi-level Governance in Practice

To kick off the event, delegates discussed the importance of subsidiarity across Europe with Ingeborg ter Laak, the Alderman of the city of Zoetermeer (South Holland). Despite highlighting the importance of Europe in addressing citizens' issues, including vaccine supply during the COVID-19 pandemic, the panel presented concrete examples of how implementing policies at a local level enriches the lives of people. Ingeborg ter Laak provided concrete proof of the potential of the local level when she initiated a project to tackle loneliness and mental health disorders, partnering with around a hundred actors from all sectors.

In a second panel, delegates delved into energy policies in Europe and their future perspectives. According to the speakers, China is flooding our market with cheap cars and solar panels. Solutions are needed to fight our dependency on China, which has a stronger supply of raw materials to produce panels and batteries.

KAS Workshop - Future of Christian Democracy in the 21st Century

Participants attended interventions on the current political scenario, where populists and far-right parties are finding consensus. According to the speakers, the EPP should stay away from that rhetoric and not forget its basic values while negotiating in politics. A focus was brought to the AfD far-right party in Germany and the role of the PVV in the formation of the Dutch government after the election of November 2023.

Panel: Defence in Depth

On Saturday morning, delegates participated in a panel discussion on defence in Europe. Speakers and participants interacted on the state of military capacity in Europe, as well as the cultural and material deficiencies that hinder the ability to respond to an armed conflict. Improving cooperation can enforce support for defence. The willingness to fight for our own country is also low, and Europe could face shortages in military personnel without reforming military service.

The Council Meeting: 6 Resolutions Approved

The core of the event came at the Council Meeting on Saturday when participants discussed and finally approved six different resolutions. "Strengthening European Cooperation in Managing Migration" deals with the need to cooperate at the European level to prevent illegal migration and to support Member States in managing migration crises. Other resolutions stressed YEPP's support for Armenia over the conflict in Nagorno-Karabakh, called for a spotlight on Yemen's humanitarian crisis, for improving the EU's policies towards the Arctic, and for driving Bosnia and Herzegovina closer to EU integration. Finally, YEPP approved a resolution to push for further sanctions on third countries that still trade with Russia.

Navigating Campaigns in the Era of Al

In light of upcoming pivotal elections across Europe and the United States, political campaigns are grappling with a rapidly evolving technological landscape. The intersection of Al advancements, cybersecurity threats, and the proliferation of deceptive content poses unprecedented challenges and opportunities for safeguarding democratic processes.

Recently, YEPP collaborated with Microsoft to host a workshop titled "Navigating Campaigns in the Era of Al." This initiative aimed to equip political leaders with essential knowledge on leveraging Al responsibly while fortifying their organisations against ovber threats. Key topics included generative AI applications in political campaigns, risk management strategies, and cybersecurity best practices.

The workshop commenced with an exploration of AI fundamentals, emphasizing its transformative role in data analysis, content creation, and campaign management. Experts underscored the importance of ethical AI usage and highlighted initiatives like the Standard C2PA, designed to combat deceptive content by marking AI-generated images.

Participants also gained practical insights into Microsoft AI tools such as Copilot, demonstrating its utility in automating campaign tasks like scheduling, fundraising, and social media management.

As campaigns continue to adapt to technological advancements, initiatives like these are crucial in promoting responsible Al adoption and enhancing cybersecurity resilience. By equipping political entities with the necessary tools and knowledge, we strive to safeguard democratic integrity and ensure fair and transparent electoral processes.



Crafting Effective YEPP Resolutions: Format, Sources, and Writing

Workshop "How to Write a Resolution"

Writing resolutions is more than gathering ideas and political statements. It requires technical skills and advanced knowledge of specific topics. On April 30th, our organisation hosted an insightful workshop titled "How to Write a Resolution," aimed at enhancing participants' skills in drafting effective political resolutions. The session was led by Alfredo Sousa De Jesus, Head of the Home Affairs Unit at the EPP Group in the European Parliament. His expertise provided invaluable guidance on structuring resolutions, highlighting key features, and clarifying their purposes.

Sousa emphasised the importance of maintaining a logical order in acknowledging points and crafting paragraphs. He advised that resolution titles should be simple and direct, avoiding unnecessary adjectives to ensure clarity and focus. The structure of a resolution, he explained, should include three main sections: an informative part, an argumentative part, and a concluding section that encapsulates the overall message. The informative part should draw from various sources, including political statements, official publications, and position papers. Sousa stressed the importance of working on writing skills, providing solid evidence, and confidently managing the topic at hand. He also highlighted common pitfalls to avoid, such as using unreliable sources, employing non-inclusive language, and including irrelevant information.

A key concept from the workshop was the significance of making resolutions appear cohesive, as if authored by a single individual, rather than a collection of disparate thoughts. This coherence is crucial for facilitating discussions and negotiations with other groups. Additionally, Sousa underscored the necessity of outreach, stressing that resolutions are meant to be shared and debated, not kept in isolation.

Overall, the workshop provided participants with essential tools to draft impactful resolutions, reinforcing the importance of clarity, coherence, and credible evidence in political writing.

The Right-Wing Resurgence:

Europe's New Political Landscape

The 2024 European Parliament elections, a festival of democracy happening every 5 years, are officially over. Around 360 million people from 27 member States had the right to cast their vote from 6-9 June (and around 22,5 million for the first time!), hoping their political option will get elected as one of 720 Members of the European Parliament, leaving someone with sweet and someone with bitter taste in their mouth.

And like in every competition, there are winners and there are losers, but the will of voters always has to be respected.

These elections have marked a significant shift to the right, with a notable increase in support from younger voters. The polls were mostly correct in their predictions – people voted with a consistent preference for far-right wing parties, whether for conservative ECR or for right-wing and populist ID parties such as *Rassemblement National* (RN), *Fratelli d'Italia* (FdI), *Prawo i Sprawiedliwość* (PiS) or *Alternative für Deutschland* (AfD), making them significantly move from the very margins of the political spectrum and political importance to the middle of it, pushing their way into the mainstream. This trend is exemplified by Marine Le Pen's *Rassemblement National* which achieved a historic success -31.37% and 30 seats in the European Parliament for ID, shocking the greens and liberals who have experienced a complete deluge and loss.

Victory of RN was the trigger for President Emmanuel Macron (whose liberal party *Renaissance* won only 13 seats) to call early elections. He had already done it once. in July 2022, after the controversial pension law was passed and that bold move paid off (liberals convincingly won). This time, the same bold move didn't bring the same expected results, but despair. The second round of national elections in France was held on July 7, 2024, and resulted in a leftwing coalition unexpectedly taking first place ahead of the far-right. Despite that, no one gain an absolute majority - 289 seats. L'Assemblée Nationale is now divided into three large groups that don't share any political views and don't have any tradition of working together: the left-wing alliance of Nouveau Front Populaire (NFP) won 182 seats. Macron's coalition Ensemble won 168 seats and Le Pen's Rassemblement National and allies won 143 seats.

The turnout was satisfying, with estimations suggesting it would be the highest in the last 40 years. Although this seems positive from the perspective of a maturing democracy, it is necessary to clearly emphasise what prompted the high turnout. The systematic neglect of certain policies and the enforcement of certain left-wing and centrist ones mobilised right-wing voters. Populists took advantage of the opportunity, embracing certain narratives to win over centrists and centre-right voters under the auspices of the hard right. The same reaction occurred not only in France but throughout the European Union. Migrant policy has been cited as the most problematic for years. With the ongoing Russian aggression on Ukraine and new narratives coming from the Far East, across the Atlantic Ocean and the rising role of the Global South, there is a challenge for Europe to stay a relevant global player.

On the other hand, the extreme left-populist coalition successfully mobilized voters opposed to the RN. As a result, France is experiencing a downward spiral in which stability, the rule of law, democratic values, and the sense of security are being undermined. Instability is a high price to pay.

In such dramatic and vibrant geopolitical environment, the European People's Party is the only political option that offers concrete and realistic solutions, putting citizens and their needs at the centre of all policies. EPP has proven to show leadership and crisis resolution skills, bravely standing behind its people, leaving no one behind. Built on the foundations of Christian democracy and solidarity, the EPP uncompromisingly supports its citizens, offering quality solutions that strengthen Europe and make it a competitive global player.

But still... Why a shift to the right then?

The shift is driven by economic insecurities, concerns over immigration, and a growing disillusionment with traditional centrist parties. These developments reflect a broader European trend where nationalist and conservative ideologies are gaining traction.

The fact that young people in this cycle of European elections voted for more rightwing options is indisputable. The next important test for Europeans will be the 2025 federal elections in Germany. After a positive result of CDU/CSU in Germany in the European Parliament elections, traditional centre-right parties could regain power. Achieving a convincing 30% of the votes, they put Germany back on track to return to a leading position in the European Union after 4 years of so called the "Traffic light coalition" ("Ampelkoalition").

In a nutshell, these trends highlight the changing political landscape of Europe, resulting in citizens looking for answers in programmes and promises of parties that were usual marginal, suggesting a future where the European Union may face significant policy and governance challenges due to the rising influence of nationalist and conservative ideologies.



Election Results for Political Groups:

•European People's Party (EPP): The winner of 2024 European elections, at the first place in Bulgaria, Croatia, Cyprus, Estonia, Finland, Germany, Greece, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Poland, Slovenia and Spain, additionally securing 6 seats in the Netherlands. EPP maintains a strong presence with significant representation by 188 seats, which is 6 more in comparison with 2019.

•Progressive Alliance of Socialists and Democrats (S&D): Experienced notable declines as voters shift towards more conservative and nationalist alternatives. S&D won 136 seats, which is 18 less in comparison with 2019.

•The Greens (Greens/EFA): Experienced a significant loss in the most recent election, securing only 54 seats compared to the 74 seats they held in 2019.

•Renew Europe (RE): Experienced huge loss with 75 seats, in comparison to 108 seats in 2019.

•The Left (GUE/NGL): The Left group in the European Parliament, despite losing 2 mandates compared to 2019, remains relatively stable. •Identity and Democracy (ID): Saw a significant decrease in seats, bolstered by parties like RN, FPO and PVV. ID won 58 seats, in comparison to 73 in 2019.

•European Conservatives and Reformists (ECR): Also experienced huge growth, reflecting the broader rightward trend. ECR won 83 seats, which is increase of 21 seats in comparison to 2019.

•Patriots for Europe: new far-right group formed in late June with 84 MEPs from 12 countries, chaired by RN president Jordan Bardella. The group consists of MEPs from aforementioned Rassemblement National (National Rally, France), Fidesz (Hungary), Lega per Salvini Premier (Italy), Vox (Spain), Chega! (Portugal), Akce nespokojených občanů - ANO 2011 (Action of Dissatisfied Citizens, Czech Republic), Přísaha and Motorists (Oath and Motorists, Czech Republic), Kereszténydemokrata Néppárt - KDNP (Christian Democratic People's Party, Hungary), Freiheitliche Partei Österreich - FPÖ (Freedom Party, Austria), Partij voor de Vrijheid - PVV (Party for Freedom, Netherlands), Vlaams Belang - VB (Flemish interest, Belgium), Dansk Folkeparti – DF (Danish People's Party, Denmark), Voice of Reason (Greece), and Latvija pirmajā vietā - LPV (Latvia First, Latvia).

Key Points:

1. Le Pen's Unprecedented Success: Marine Le Pen's *Rassemblement National* has seen a remarkable rise in parliamentary seats - from just 6 seats in 2017 to over 250 in 2024 underscores the party's growing influence. This surge is largely attributed to widespread dissatisfaction with President Macron's policies, which many voters feel have failed to address critical economic and social issues. Le Pen's platform, focusing on nationalism, economic protectionism, and stricter immigration controls, openly addressing real, evident problems that exist in society, resulted with a broad base of voters seeking change.

2. Youth Support for Right-Wing Parties: Economic uncertainties, job insecurities, and dissatisfaction with the political establishment are driving younger voters towards right-wing parties. The younger demographic, facing high unemployment rates and precarious job markets, finds appeal in the right's promises of economic stability and national prioritization. Additionally, the perceived failure of left-wing parties to effectively address immigration and integration issues has led to a loss of confidence among young voters. The same goes with the lack of affordable housing, topic for which right-wing populist parties proposed appealing, but unrealistic solutions. This shift represents a significant change in political engagement, with the youth now playing a pivotal role in the rightward swing. Furthermore, the rise of social media, where young people are very active, has given a platform to right-wing

voices and movements that might not have had as much visibility in traditional media to quickly spread their ideas and make tempting promises to young people, especially first-time voters.

3. Broader European Trends: Across Europe, nationalist and conservative parties are gaining momentum as voters seek alternatives to traditional centrist policies. This trend reflects a growing sentiment against globalization, with many citizens feeling left behind by the benefits it purportedly brings. Also, there can be a backlash against what some (young) people perceive as left-wing excessive political correctness and identity politics that are being forcefully imposed on them through the aggressive narrative. Progressive social policies and green agenda that they are promoting overburden the citizens, disregard their real needs and don't valorise fair work and contribution to society. We should also remember the security factor, which is closely linked to migration policies which were outdated and were not adequate to fit the new situation. This reaction and disappointment in policies that didn't deliver can drive voters towards right-wing alternatives that are moderate in tone, promise safety, a return to traditional values and economic policies with a "common sense" prefix. This broader European trend suggests a significant realignment in the political landscape, challenging the future cohesion of the European Union.



News from EU Bubble

Highlights from past weeks

• The Labour Party reports a landslide victory in the UK general elections. Results from the 4th of July ballots awarded 411 seats (+209 compared to 2019) to Labour, 121 seats for the Conservative Party (-244 seats), and a strong advancement for the Liberal Democrats, with 72 seats assigned (+61). Sixty-one-year-old human rights lawyer Keir Starmer, leader of the Labour Party, is set to become the next Prime Minister.

• Le Front Populaire wins Parliamentary elections in France: After the success of the National Rally (NR), the far-right party led by Marine Le Pen, in the first round, the left-wing Popular Front (NFP – GUE/S&D, The Greens) came first in the second round last Sunday. President Emmanuel Macron's Ensemble (Renew) came second, and for NR, just a bronze medal. No coalition obtained an absolute majority.

• Orbán, Kickl, and Babiš to launch the Patriots for Europe: The new extreme-right group in the Euro-

pean Parliament reached the threshold to constitute a new group, including 30 MEPs from Marine Le Pen's National Rally (currently ID). The group would become the third largest in the Parliament and will feature parties from Portugal (Chega), Spain (Vox), and the Netherlands (PVV).

Legislative Pipeline

• **Ist Strasbourg Session:** From July 16th to 19th, the European Parliament will gather in Strasbourg for its first plenary session under the new mandate. The President and Vice-Presidents of the Parliament will be elected, and decisions will be made regarding the composition of each parliamentary committee. Afterwards, attention will turn to the election of the President of the European Commission. Ursula von der Leyen, the candidate proposed by EU leaders, will deliver her statement in the Strasbourg Parliament. To secure approval from Parliament, the candidate must gather the support of more than half of all MEPs, plus one.

• The European Commission has imposed provisional countervailing duties on Chinese battery electric vehicle (BEV) imports to protect its domestic market. This action follows an investigation uncovering unfair subsidisation in China's BEV industry. Duties are now applied to sampled producers, effective July 5, 2024, aiming to support EU producers until a final decision within four months. Consultations with Chinese authorities are ongoing to seek a mutual resolution.

What's next?

• The Hungarian Council presidency poses doubts on diplomatic relations between the EU and Russia regarding the war in Ukraine. In the first days at the head of the Council of the European Union, Viktor Orbán's Hungary is leaning toward proposing a ceasefire in Ukraine and mediating peace talks between Moscow and Kyiv. Orbán's pro-Putin attitude in the past years disappoints other EU leaders. Orbán is the only head of State in the Union that maintains close ties with Russia even after the start of the war.

• Will Democrats still bet on Biden? Concerns are spreading among liberals about the fitness of their candidate Joe Biden for the next presidential election in the United States. The names of potential replacements such as Vice President Kamala Harris and Governor of California Gavin Newsom are on everyone's lips. According to the New York Times, big donors of the Democratic Party are threatening to withdraw funds if Biden does not give up on running.

• What if the Israeli internal front shrinks? According to international newspapers, Israeli generals would be in favour of a ceasefire in Gaza. Reports suggest that anonymous sources in the IDF (Israel Defence Forces) claim that after nine months of war, the army is running out of spare parts, ammunition, motivation, and even soldiers. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu categorically excluded this possibility.

Get to Know: Junge Union Deutschlands!

Junge Union (JU) is the joint youth organisation of the two conservative German political parties, CDU and CSU. CDU/CSU is not only Germany's but also Europe's biggest people's party. The current chairman of Junge Union, elected in 2022, is Johannes Winkel.

Fauda



This series in three seasons (the fourth is on the way) follows the adventures of Samy Kantor, a young and inexperienced parliamentary assistant in Brussels. Working for a frequently absent and indifferent French MEP, Samy handles an amendment on finning, the practice of cutting off sharks' fins. The series uses irony and satire to depict the functioning of the European Parliament, breaking free from usual stereotypes.
